

# Evidencing the Impact of Primary Physical Education and Sport Premium

Department for Education Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium

**ALL** pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge, skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy, active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport.

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following **OBJECTIVE**:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision (*above*) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

**It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:**

1. the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. increased participation in competitive sport


It is a statutory requirement of Ofsted, under their Common Inspection Framework, to ensure that information on the use of the Primary PE and Sport Premium is available on your school website. One of the key purposes of putting information on the school website is to keep parents informed, so this information should be written in a format that is clear and easily accessible. After every update, please remember to upload the latest version to your website.

Primary Physical Education and Sport premium planning and actions should show how use of funding contributes to this vision through identified school priorities which can be measured through reference to key outcome indicators. It is important that the main drivers for improvement are those identified by the school through their self-review. Each school should aim to achieve the following objective:

**OBJECTIVE:** To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools.

## **Information from the DFE:**

### **Purpose**

- In April 2013, the Government announced new funding of £150 million for Physical Education (PE) and sport. This funding should be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision. In 2016, it was announced that the funding would continue and double!
- Funding will be allocated to all maintained and state-funded schools with primary phase pupils, including: primary, middle, special and non-maintained special schools, academies and pupil referral units from 1 September 2013. A typical primary school received about £9,250 annually in the academic years 2013/14, 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2016/2017 increasing to £16,000 + £10.00 per pupil for 2017/2018 and beyond.
- Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision, including increasing participation in PE and sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

### **SS Peter & Paul Sports Premium Funding Allocation**

- Our PE and Sports Premium funding is received for each child.
- During the academic year 2018-2019 SS Peter & Paul received £18,100 Sports Premium Funding.  
(£8,000 + £10 per child [210 x £10 = £2,100] = £18,100)
- For the academic year 2019-2020 it is anticipated that the school will receive in total £18,100 Sports Premium Funding.  
(£16,000 + £10 per child [210 x £10 = £2,100] = £18,100)

### **SS Peter & Paul Required Impact**

- Increase in the quality of PE provision
- Increased access to and participation in after school sporting opportunities
- Increased participation and success in local tournaments and competitive sports
- Widening participation in sport across the school leading to improvement in pupils' health and well being
- Improved staff training and resources resulting in improved teaching and learning in PE

## HOW TO USE THE PRIMARY PE AND SPORT PREMIUM

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. You should use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, you can use your funding to:

- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and [Change4Life](#) clubs
- run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the [School Games](#)
- run sports activities with other schools

You should **not** use your funding to:

- employ coaches or specialist teachers to cover [planning preparation and assessment \(PPA\)](#) arrangements - these should come out of your core staffing budgets
- teach the minimum requirements of [the national curriculum](#) – including those specified for swimming.
